





How Can Older People with Managed Personal Budgets be Ensured Personalised Support? Interim findings

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Context and Rationale

- Mechanisms for managing Personal Budgets (PBs)
 - Cash direct payments
 - Managed personal budgets
 - Local authority-managed
 - Provider-managed (known as Individual Service Funds)
- Most older people prefer managed PBs
- Most managed PBs used for home care

Aims and Methods

- To explore factors affecting the delivery of personalised support to older people who opt for managed PBs
 - Identify market development activities
 - Explore support planners' roles in shaping older people's expectations and requests
 - Explore home care provider responses to changes in contracts and older people's requests
 - Examine older people's experiences
- Interviews and focus groups in three local authorities in England

Market Development Activities

- Changes in commissioning systems
 - Framework agreements
 - Brokerage systems
 - Individual Service Funds

- Market shaping initiatives
 - Innovation funds
 - Market development officers

Support Planners' Experiences

- Changes in commissioning systems
 - Framework drives up quality through competition
 - But block providers favoured and have no incentives to change practice
 - Want more Framework agencies, especially in rural areas
 - Bypass broker system or work together
- Market shaping initiatives
 - Creative thinking versus availability of services

Agency Managers' Experiences

- Changes in commissioning systems
 - Framework contracts make it hard to group clients
 - Block contracts distort the market
 - Communication issues/broker knowledge
 - Amount of budgets not always known
 - Bureaucracy and lack of trust
- Market shaping initiatives
 - Great ideas, not widely known
 - Some new services, e.g. Mops and Shops

Reflections

 Intentions good but messages not getting through

Laissez faire versus paternalism

 Some initiatives work best in particular circumstances, e.g. urban
